# More About the Sarracenia Flava

The beautiful greenish yellow trumpets of Sarracenia flava are abundantly spectacular in low boggy pinelands of Northwest Florida. The trumpets (or pitchers) are actually stemless leaves arising up from below the soil where they are attached to slender creeping rhizomes. The flowers when present are 3 or more inches in diameter and hang from their tall leafless stems. their faces toward the ground. They consist of five sepals, five showy spatulate petals, numerous stamens surrounding the extraordinary pistil, the fleshy style of which is shaped like an umbrella (upside down) with a stigma under each of the five angles.

Insects are attracted by the bright colors of the trumpet-shaped leaves and are enticed to explore into them by minute droplets of honey-like substance secreted by glands on the under surface of the "lids". Intermingled with the glands are downward pointing hairs, which lead the victims to a slippery area which offers them no foot-hold. They are precipitated into the fluid at the base of the trumpet. from which they cannot escape. They soon perish and are digested by enzymes secreted by glands at the base of the

leaves. Hence they are known as "insectivorous" plants. In opening the leaf, it is not uncommon to find the remains of flies, beetles, and ants, filling the pitcher to a depth of several inches and resulting in a disagreeable odor.

They require acid soil and bog conditions for successful growing. The soil should be mostly black organic matter and sand. A sunny location is preferable. They can be grown in pots in which case\* "good drainage is necessary to enable the liberal quantities of water which the plant requires to pass freely away. For this purpose the best compost consists of three parts of fibrous peat from which all fine particles have been shaken, and one part of spaghnum, moss, together with a small quantity of lump charcoal."

The genus is named for Dr. Michel Sarracin, physician at the court of Quebec early in the 18th Century. He sent our northern species to Europe where the plants were eventually studied by Dr. Linnaeus at the University in Upsala, Sweden, who established the genus and named it for the good doctor—Sarracenia. The specific name flava refers to the striking yellow color, of both flowers and trumpets (leaves).



Mrs. Kenneth F. Davis [Lucille] from California. Japanese ancestry. She was educated in Japan and America. She holds teachers certificates in three schools: Ikenobo, Koru and Kazan. Mrs. Davis did post graduate work in Senkenka in the Ikenobo Institute of Ochanomizu, Tokyo. She now holds the degree of Senior Professor. She is one of the leading authorities in the United States on Contemporary Rikka. She was founding president of the Ikebana

International Chapter of Kamakura, Japan. She was chosen to represent the Ikenobo Institute at the Trade Fair in Caracus, Venezuela in 1967, where 200,000 people participated. She is head of the East and Central Florida Chapter of Ikenobo. Mrs. Davis is a Nationally Accredited Flower Show Judge and now lives in Deltona, Florida.

Mrs. Charles H. Blanchard [Van] Pensacola—A graduate of the University of Alabama holds a Doctor of Jurisprudence from Samford University, Birmingham, Ala. She is a Master Judge, a Landscape Design Critic and is a Past President of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. # Highlights of the 1979 Spring Symposium

Mrs. James E. Shelley Symposium Chairman

Come join us for a great learning experience at "Symposium by the Sea" in Jacksonville Beach at the Sheraton Inn on March 7-8.

Wednesday, March 7, the Symposium opens with a lecture on Bromelaids by Mr. Bud Martin, a transplanted Pennsylvanian, who became fascinated with Bromelaids while traveling in Central America.

He turned his Bromelaid hobby into a full time business, Blossom World Bromelaids, in Sanford, Fla. Mr. Martin lectures throughout the state, conducts workshops for the physically handicapped, is President of Seminole Bromelaid Society, and Vice-President of the Bromelaid Society of Central Florida. He will bring a variety of lovely bromelaids with him that will be for sale.

Mrs. Calvin Flint of Batesville, Mississippi will also lecture on Wednesday. Her topic will be ferns. Mrs. Flint is well known throughout the South for her love of horticulture. She is a graduate of Delta State University, Cleveland, Mississippi, and did graduate work at the University of Mississippi. She is a National Council Instructor for Horticulture and Flower Show Procedure and has taught flower show schools all over the South and other areas. Mrs. Flint has published articles in Flower Grower and Southern Living Magazines and has a telephone answering service for the community on horticulture. The exam on ferns will follow at 3:00 p.m.

## A FEW GESNERIADS

by Mrs. R. E. Hunter, Chmn. Improved Cultivars

More and more attention is being paid to Gesneriads in our flower shows and plant societies. At first they tagged along in the wake of their famous cousins, the Saintpaulias, and they were known for years as the African Violet relatives. Now in many areas interest in the species and varieties of this unusual plant family has outstripped the interest in the Saintpaulia. There are two national societies devoted to the culture of Gesneriads and many local clubs.

Part of this interest has been due to the current vogue for hanging baskets. Many Gesneriads such as Columneas, Hypocyrtos and Episcias are perfect subjects for hanging baskets.


In the genus Columnea, Dr. Robert E. Lee made a now famous series of fourteen crosses from the collection of the Bailey Hortorium at Cornell. These came to light in the early sixties and much of the current interest in this genus is credited to his work. It gave impetus to later hybridizers and called their attention to the possibilities latent in the species.

Episcias have also been a favorite with hybridizers because of the challenge of creating ever more beautiful foliage. Among the more distinctive recent hybrids have been those with pink foliage. Among the more distinctive recent hybrids have been those with pink foliage. It is usually mixed or marked with green

or white, but pink is the dominant color. Cleopatra and Pink Brocade are leaders in this category.

Sinningias have long had a place in African Violet shows and their insouciance as a charming miniature is undeniable. Now a larger relative is appearing at nurseries and flower shows. This is the Strptocarpus with its startling colors and long-lasting blooms. The breakthrough between the various African species and the modern house plant came about largely through the hybridizing which produced the constant Nymph series of plants. These hybrids were larger, more floriferous and more suited to our growing conditions than their predecessors. and through irradiation a number of new and vibrant colors have been added to the series.


These Streptocarpus are fairly easy to grow but should be dry between waterings. Our principal problem with them in Florida is their preference for slightly cooler conditions than ours. Even the new. more tolerant cultivars have a temperature range of 550 - 850. It is to be hoped there will be more experimentation with these lovely plants to see if they can become acclimated to our Florida conditions or if we can become more aware of their growing needs because the rewards of being able to add the lovely Streptocarpus to our homes and gardens will be tremendous.





#### **SPEEDING SEEDS**

Some gardeners use water as hot as it will come out of the faucet to water seeds when starting them indoors. They claim this method speeds up germination by several days.



#### SOAK SUMMER SQUASH

Soaking summer squash seed in kerosene overnight before planting will utilmately benefit the plant by repelling squash borers. Works on cantaloupe seed as well.

#### **ROSE PIPELINE**

Beside some of your roses, at planting time, sink "water pipe" 20 inch lengths of PVC or polyethylene pipe, 1-1/2 inch diameter, with small holes drilled in the lower 15 inches. The top opening is left just above ground, to receive hose water and take it down deep where the roots are. Water poured on top of the ground with your hose rarely reaches the roots.

#### **ENERGY SAVING TIP**

If every dishwasher user in the country cut out just one load a week, we'd save almost 16 million kilowatt-hours of electricity every day or the equivalent of about 9,000 barrels of oil a day.

#### **BROCCOLI VERSUS BUNNIES**

To keep rabbits away from broccoli, cover each plant with a 20-inch "box" made of nylon netting held up by stakes at the corners. It goes over the top, down the sides, and is anchored to the ground with small stones, so it's easily removable for picking the broccoli.

#### **BOOKLET BONANZA**

Often trees show disease-like symptoms that cannot be identified with any disease or pest. A new booklet, "How To Identify and Control Noninfectious Diseases of Trees," is now available, containing pictures of the symptoms in color and matching them with the causes. #### **BOTTLES RECYCLED**

To protect tomato or other seedlings from frosts use a bottle cutting outfit to cut the bottoms out of some old gallon bottles, such as cider or milk come in. Then, place the bottle over the seedling and control temperature inside by putting the cap on or off.

#### **ORGANIC GARDENING**

A non-chemical spray can be made by selecting plants or the leaves of plants that have not been attacked by chewing insects. Put them in a blender with a little water. Dilute this by using 1/4 to 1/2 cup per sprinkling can (2-1/2 gals.) and sprinkle affected plant. The theory being to change the flower of the infected plant to that of one insects don't like. The spray must be used again after a rain.

#### **BAKED BIRD SEED**

To try to avoid wild bird seed germinating when it falls to the earth, bake it at 350 degrees for about a half hour. The birds seem to like it and there will not be unwanted plants to pull out.

## News for Judges and Flower Show Schools Chairmen

Mrs. Steve Fritch

In answer to the need for a standard title for Life and Master Flower Show Judges who no longer wish or are able to keep their Good Standing, the Board of Directors of National Council has authorized that "Judges Emeritus" may be used.

This title must be requested to the State Flower Show Schools Chairman by such Life and Master Judges. When this title is bestowed. the State Chairman will report the name of the judge to National Council Headquarters.

Reminder: Your original Judging certificate is dated by the date of the Reading Exam which was successfully completed by that student.

The original date (month and day) is repeated on your renewal. regardless of the month or day you renewed between the second and third year. The year changes by adding three years to the date.

Life Certificates are issued as of the date application is received at National Council Headquarters. (This may be added after the last paragraph in your new Handbook under "Life Certificate", page 93.)

Please read the Sept.-Oct. issue, National Gardener, page 21, concerning Clarification of Free-Form.

The National Flower Show Schools Committee recommends that a section of a flower show eligible for an Award of Merit have at least 12 entries as well as at least three classes, and that no more than Five Award of Merits be given in any one show. (This is just a recommendation)



## YOUTH ENVIRONMENTAL CONFERENCE

Mrs. Daniel F. Connell SEEK '79 Chairman

Good news for all you clubs, circles, and individuals who sponsor students and adult leaders to attend FFGC's Youth Environmental Conference, SEEK. In answer to requests made by practically everyone who attended SEEK '78, we are going to continue the quality and quantity of instruction and lab work as in the past, but are going to spread it out over one more day so that the students have more time to digest the knowledge being literally 'poured' into them. In 1979 the conference will start Sunday, Aug. 5th and will close Thurs., Aug. 9th. Housing and classroom facilities at Florida Technological University, Orlando will be the same as in past years. Adding one day naturally increases the cost of the conference. FTU has agreed to add only the housing (room and board) costs. Scholarships will be \$70 for a whole scholarship and \$35 for a half. Donors of \$15 or more will be presented certificates at District

Meetings.

The subject for '79 will be general environmental issues: air, energy, soil, etc. There are many advantages in adding one day to the conference, among which is the additional time for group discussions. It is in these 'rap sessions' that students work out practical applications of the knowledge presented to them in the lectures and labs. They plan use of this knowledge for their clubs, schools, and home communities. Your committee feels that by adding one day we are actually doubling the value of the conference.


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## WEKIVA '79

Now is the time to get out that camp brochure (the yellow one with the cabin and kiddies on the front) and begin to think of which young people you'd like to send this year. Remember that Wekiva is not only for members of Jr. Garden Clubs (though that gives you a chance to award your best students) but also for the children and grandchildren of your own club members.

Any boy or girl, grades 3 through 7 (as of the current year) who is interested in nature—how to appreciate our big beautiful outdoors, how to use it wisely, and how to preserve it for the future—will love Wekiva. Nature walks, crafts using natural materials, and a little conservation are woven into the regular camp program of swimming, sports, cabin fun, and evenings around the campfire.

If you didn't get enough brochures, and of course you didn't, for most clubs send many more than one child, additional brochures may be secured from your district youth chairman or from the Camp Registrar Mrs. Robert S. Hanks, Rt. 3, Box 90-C, Clermont, Fl. 32711.

This year we will again have two weeks for boys (June 17-23; June 24-30) one co-ed session (July 1-7) for grades 3, 4, and 5 only; and 3 girls' weeks (July 8-14; July 15-21; and July 22-28).

A special advanced program for those who have finished the eighth grade will be given the weeks of June 24-30 (boys) and July 15-21 (girls). These eighth grade sessions grew out of a need to fill the gap between campers and CIT's, and was begun as a pilot project last summer. The program is built around the environmental workshop idea, but includes counseling skills

and the usual camp activities such as crafts, swimming, cook-outs, skits, singing, etc. So successful was it in 1978 that it is being offered again this year with minor modifications. The number of 8th graders accepted will be very limited (first come, first served) so be sure to choose wisely and send us your very best. In a few years these will be our counselors, in charge of the cabins, so it's important to start with the best and give them the finest training we can.

Fees this year are \$55 per camper—a slight increase over last year, as we try to keep up with inflation. Send your reservations early (after Feb. 1) with your check, because, as usual, space is limited. Indicate the week you want each reservation. The camper can send in his registration letter.

At Wekiva, this summer, we need: ADULT VOLUNTEERS to teach nature study, ecology, environmental education, or native crafts.

NURSES, CANTEEN MANAGERS, AND OFFICE HELPERS (typing, filing, etc.) for each week.

SENIOR COUNSELORS (paid) male or female who have completed at least 11th grade. These come for 2, 3, or 4 weeks.

JR. COUNSELORS (unpaid) males or females who have completed at least 10th grade. These come for a maximum or 2 weeks usually.

CIT's These come for only one week and pay regular fees. They must have finished 9th grade.


